The Nominating Committee for the Friends of Mineralogy is pleased to submit the following nominations for Board of Directors positions for the period of 2011-2014:

Allan Young is a registered professional mining engineer with over 30 years experience in the mining industry in the western U.S. and Latin America. He is currently employed by Bureau of Land Management as the Idaho State Program Lead for the Mining Law Administration and surface management of mining claims. He was fortunate to have worked at the Idarado mine in Colorado for several years before it closed, and while he had become interested in minerals before that, this experience really whetted his appetite for collecting. He enjoys field collecting with friends, primarily in Idaho, and has served on the FM Board since 2005.

Gloria Staebler is a current member of the national Board of Directors of FM. She is past newsletter editor and served as Secretary for 8 years. Gloria received her B.S. in mathematics and computer science from Wesleyan University. Gloria along with Guenther Neumeier publish the MINERAL monograph series, which stemmed from their buying the English-language rights, in 2001, to the German mineralogical monograph series extraLapis. She has coedited and copublished 14 books in the monograph series as well as a number of out-of-series titles, including the award-winning and highly regarded American Mineral Treasures. Gloria is currently working on several projects including a book celebrating Arizona's mineral collecting heritage.

Aaron Wieting is a registered professional geologist in the State of Oregon and currently works for the City of Portland on water quality issues. He received his degree in geology from Portland State University and is a past president of the Pacific Northwest Chapter of FM. He has also served as chair for three PNWFM Symposiums in addition to other duties, and is an active supporter of the Rice Museum and the museum's Northwest Gallery. Aaron has been an avid field collector since he was old enough to walk and currently specializes in Oregon and Owens Valley, California minerals, though collecting excursions may take him and his wife, Jade, anywhere in the western US. In particular, he enjoys discovering and characterizing new or incompletely documented localities. He also enjoys introducing the next generation of mineral collectors to the hobby.

Nelson Shaffer has been a member of Friends of Mineralogy since 1977. He is a founding member of the Midwest Chapter of FM and has served in various officer positions for that group. He acted as president of the National FM for two years after serving as vice president, and other positions and has been a member of the board of directors for several years. Nelson is FM representative to the American Geologic Institute. Nelson has set up the FM outreach booth at the Tucson Show for the past five years and made many other outreach efforts. Nelson holds degrees in geology from the Ohio State University (1972 and 1974) and from Indiana University (1996). He has published more than 120 papers, abstracts, maps, or book chapters about geology and has headed many field trips, most recently the Midwest Chapter Field Symposium about Geodes in Indiana and Kentucky. A long time collector, researcher, writer, and teacher, Nelson has studied minerals for many years and tries always to share his fascination, and to attract others to the field.

Chapter News

Colorado:

The Creede Mineral Symposium was held during September 10-12, 2010, in Creede, Colorado. Bruce Geller reports, "the symposium was a great success and 'a highlight of our year.' Creede was a beautiful, historic, and excellent place to hold it. Many registrants felt that the conference was very well organized, speakers were interesting, and it was generally well run. All speakers were relevant and knowledgeable. One registrant made particularly fond mention of Pete Modreski's talk. Both field trips were fun and worthwhile. We received many compliments about the banquet (fabulous), food, drink, and snack breaks. Some folks mentioned the dealers, poster sessions, displays, and very reasonable costs. A hearty thank you to everyone who helped organize and execute the conference."

Midwest:

Members of the Midwest Chapter were saddened to learn of the passing of long-time Field Trip Chairman Ernie Carlson in November. Ernie was a geology professor at Kent State University and had written extensively about Ohio Minerals, including a summary published in a 1986 issue of Rocks & Minerals. He will be missed by his many students and friends. Reggie Rose, Field Trip Chairman for the Columbus Rock and Mineral Society as well, will assume this post. On December 11, FM and other Midwest club members collected the well known pyrite nodules at the Harding Street Quarry in Indianapolis. Collecting was very good for these interesting pyrite specimens, thought to be from fossilized clams.

Pacific Northwest:

The PNWFM Symposium was held in Kelso, Washington during October 15-17, 2010. The theme of this year's Symposium was "Minerals of Australia." John Lindell reports, "Penny Williamson, John Sobolewski and Harvey Jong headlined the speaker program for this year's symposium on Minerals of Australia. All gave informative and enjoyable

talks which were very appreciated by a packed room of PNWFM members." "Many of the fourteen display cases on the main show floor featured specimens of Australian origin. Ray Lasmanis was able to secure cases of high caliber specimens from some of the premier collections in the Pacific Northwest." "A highlight of the show was the awarding of the Noble Witt award for outstanding service to the goals of the Friends of Mineralogy. The award which hasn't been presented in the last few years went to a very deserving member, Wes Gannaway."

Pennsylvania:

The Pennsylvania Chapter's Fall Symposium was held on November 6, 2010. Ron Sloto presented two talks entitled, "Classic Chester County Mineral Localities, Part 2" and "The Pennsylvania Granite Corporation Quarry – A Different Kind of Quarry." Joe Dague presented a talk entitled, "Pennsylvania Classics from the Genth Collection," and Peter Leavens presented a talk entitled, "Why strontianite, why wavellite in Pennsylvania's Paleozoic carbonates?"

Southern California

A mineral locality symposium and field trip, sponsored by the Southern California Chapter of the Friends of Mineralogy and the UC Riverside Geology Department, was held during October 23-24, 2010. Talks were presented on subjects including diamond formation, lithium-bearing pegmatites, sulfide mineral oxidation in seawater and tungstate mineral dissolution in groundwater. A field trip consisting of 25 participants was made to the Cryo Genie Mine. Participants were able to wash and screen tailings for tourmaline, and many beautiful prisms were found.
